### **Olympic stuff and Glass Games**

Herewith an extract from a recent news release from the Contemporary Glass Society (CGS) on an event that we covered some while back, and which BGF has supported. Note the planned visit to our very own Ruskin down in sunny Amblecote ...

'Just as the relay of the Olympic torch will link the whole of the UK to the London Games, a stunning glass baton is about to start its journey to link events for Glass Games 2012. This summer, there are more than 70 chances to discover the magic of glass, in a nationwide Olympic-inspired programme of events that celebrate the skills of glass artists - Glass Games 2012. From June 1 to September 30, there will be exhibitions, tours, workshops, have-ago sessions and more in a packed programme of glass-related events, brought together by CGS. As well as glass events all over the UK, seven major venues will host a stunning glass baton, created especially for the Games by artist Bruce Marks.'

'Last but one stop in the marathon journey is The Ruskin Glass Centre in Stourbridge for *Medallions*, an exhibition based on imaginative interpretations of the Olympic medal by leading glass artists. The event, which runs from August 22 to September 15, includes a treasure hunt and an opening event.'

... and it was all fabulous. Worth 5 hours in the car for a 2½ hour visit although I would have loved longer there. I took some vases up to be looked at and the people could not have been more helpful, interested and generally just fantastic, going out of their way to look things up and find design numbers/dates etc. I must have talked with John Smith for an hour and very special thanks to him for all his insight, information and help and for coming in today even though he wasn't due to be in.  $\Box$  The glass was beautiful. There were a good few Stevens and Williams vases that definitely needed to be in my house, plus a couple of Webb's and some studio and pâte de verre pieces. I could definitely make more room here. It was all fascinating but the best bits, apart from talking to John and the others, were  $\Box$ - seeing the sizes of some of the vases, something which is just not conveyed by photos on the web even with a size description - they were huge and magnificent. I tried

to imagine making something that size and having it go wrong, eek! □- seeing a large 'Silveria' vase - glorious□- the pâte-de-verre room and some of the studio glass work□-talking to Allister Malcolm.□We had a quick 20 minutes in the Glass Cone and seeing the enormous Stuart Peacock trail vases was something else. We also watched Charlotte Hughes-Martin blowing a specific piece for a designer - wonderful to watch. Charlotte was great at explaining what she was doing and why, something I didn't experience when I last watched glass-blowing in France, which was done in complete silence. OH said that was the best bit of his day. I would like to go again and have a lot longer to wander and absorb. It's a wonderful museum.

I ask you, what better reason could there possibly be that to Keep it Glass.
