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# Progress on the home front – a Special Item



Proposals for a new glass museum on the White House Cone site, opposite the historic Red House Cone, in Wordsley are a step closer following the submission of a bid for European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) funding by Dudley Council in conjunction with the developer Complex Developments Limited and the British Glass Foundation. Should the bid prove successful, a further application to Heritage Lottery funding is planned.

The project will remove one of the area's major eyesores, which has been the subject of several

arson attacks, by restoring the Grade 2 listed historic building and preserving the remains of the White House Cone, a Scheduled Ancient Monument.

Following discussions with Dudley Council the intention is for the British Glass Foundation (BGF) to become a Museum Trust to eventually take over the running of the brand new glass museum, which will house the Broadfield House glass collections. This is a major turning point for the charity, which, from very humble beginnings, has developed into a well-respected and recognised body. In a very short space of time the Foundation has helped protect the glass collections and has raised the profile of glassmaking and the collections in Stourbridge.

Graham Knowles, BGF Chairman, said: 'The site will become a visitor attraction that tells the story of the Stourbridge glass industry bringing together the whole of the glass quarter and linking in with the other major visitor attractions in the area including Dudley Zoo and Castle, Black Country Living Museum and Dudley Canal Trust. This will enhance tourism in the area and boost the local economy'.

This significant news of progress on plans for the development of a world-class facility would ordinarily be sufficient in itself to justify a *GlassCuts* all of its own.

Ian Dury, proprietor of Stourbridge Glass Engravers and 2012 Portland Vase Project Coordinator, has, on hearing the latest news regarding the Stuart site, offered the entire collection of artifacts comprising the replica Portland Vase and base plate, Auldjo Jug, Olympic Vase *et al*, for housing at the new facility when it is up and running. Ian, who has made no secret of his desire to keep his prized treasures in the Stourbridge area, informs us that he feels this would

be a suitable place to demonstrate not only the history of the area but also to highlight the talents still extant here.

BGF Chairman Graham Knowles, commenting on Ian's incredible largesse, says: 'The 2012 Portland Vase will be the centre piece of the new museum. This particular piece of glass gave birth to much of the glass-making craze in Stourbridge and Wordsley at the turn of the century and made us the finest centre for creating and decorating glass in the world at our zenith'.
