Work on the Portland Vase replica at Ruskin Centre is quietly but steadily going in the right direction. Project Coordinator Ian Dury

(http://www.stourbridgeglassengraversdy8.co.uk) has shown me the first 'rushes' of a video he is compiling to cover the momentous events going on down there, and mighty fine it's beginning to look. The 2012 Portland Vase project is a huge fillip to the area and is already generating enormous interest. It is therefore vital that the facts surrounding this are accurately recorded for posterity, and so I know ('cos I have asked him) that Ian will welcome us suggesting that all enquiries be directed through him in the first instance. Thanks for that.

Big piece, huge gesture

The story so far ... The Blue Basket, by Jacqueline Cooley, is a large - 48cms across by 7cms tall - fused and slumped woven blue bowl made from sheet glass with ground and polished rim, signed and dated 2004. It featured at the recent Fielding's auction to raise monies for BGF but unfortunately, despite the fact that it is simply gorgeous, failed to sell. Stepping up to the mark to right this wrong is accountancy firm Clement Keys, who very kindly act *pro bono* for BGF and who are about to purchase the plate, with proceeds going to BGF. That is support indeed, and takes the total collected as a result of the auction to a tad under £7,500. And so, to bring you bang up to date, the moment will be recorded by way of a formal presentation and exchange. Arrangements are in hand for this to be held at Broadfield House, 10.00am Monday 7th November. All are invited.
