Well, as my mate, a Professor of English, from Gornal says: 'It's bin and cum and gone.' And what an event it turned out to be. The plot was to take a bunch of cartographers - wake up at the back, that's people who make maps - and, by way of transporting them several leagues from their more usual comfort zones, expose them to the delights on offer around The Dark Region.

Festive Fayre included a boat trip through the Dudley limestone caverns, a jaunt around the Black Country Living Museum, an examination of documentary jewels in the local archives and, but of course, faggots 'n paes at Ma Pardoe's. That was just Day 1. It was Day 2 that will be of interest to glass fans, as we took them on a guided canal walk through the Stourbridge Glass Industry, then let them roam in desultory fashion around Red House Cone for a while, before wantonly abandoning them to the mercy of Charlotte Hughes-Martin, who wrapped them all in pinnies and safety goggles to teach them the finer points of glass engraving. The mood was heightened by this being the same time that RHC was holding its 1940s weekend, with Charlotte suitably attired and creating the impression of a rather dominant school-ma'am, a role which she evidently relished with glee. Honestly, you should have seen them all at it, brows knotted in concentration, with more than one showing a remarkably quick grasp of the knack. The afternoon concluded in slightly more erudite fashion, with a presentation on the 2012 Portland Vase Project.
