And Allister goes Doodle-side, with an appeal

Back in August 2012 - where has that year gone? - Allister Malcolm, Resident Glass Artist at Broadfield House Glass Museum and fellow BGF Trustee, went head to head with Elliot Walker at Red House in the World's Longest Glassmaking Demo. The event, which was intended to raise funds for BGF and, ultimately, the proposed new museum, was covered widely by the media, including, of course, *GlassCuts*. It was unquestionably a huge success. Which left Allister in a bit of a quandary - what to do next? Well, we left him in a dark hole for a while to see what he could come up with. And come up with something, he has. Let him tell you about it in his own words

...

'There was such an amazing response and support from artists, suppliers and members of the public for the worlds longest glassmaking demo. My feet are, even now, only just beginning to touch the ground - I think the total raised came to around the £14,000 mark. What a day! But, as the dust settled from this project, I admit to wondering how we could top that.

After a few months of contemplation, with beer in hand, an idea began to foment: Celebrity doodles, to be transformed in to works of art!



The plan is that supporters of the BGF advise us of someone famous and who would be willing to provide a doodle for us on one of our specially prepared kits. With a signature to go with the doodle, the proposal is that glass artists can then take the drawings and produce a piece which relates to the sketches or doodles, resulting in a unique collector's piece.

So how can our friends and supporters help this time around? Well, we are appealing on the number of fronts:

- 1) For artists to volunteer their time to produce a piece of glass in line with the plan. The type of piece, be it jewelry, cast blown, engraved or stained glass, is not so important as the willingness and enthusiasm to participate.
- 2) For suppliers to pitch in some materials to enable artists to achieve some cracking results. Or provide facilities from which artists could produce pieces.

3) For members of the public whom might know of someone famous or noteworthy, to put forward their suggestions to us and make approaches to get the doodles.

I the wake of the success of the demo, I am really excited to see where this project could go, and I am optimistic that we can raise vital funds to preserve the collections and in doing so help spread the word about our aims.

My thanks to Simon Bruntnell, of Northlight Photography <u>www.northlightphotography.co.uk</u>, who has already agreed to offer his services for the cause again.

Will Farmer of Fielding's Auctioneers <u>www.fieldingsauctioneers.co.uk</u>, has once more agreed to step forward and auction the doodles alongside the glass works, with proceeds from to the BGF. The support of Fielding's has been amazing, and I am very grateful.'

Hot tales and cold ales



It's not every day we get news here at BGF bunker HQ quite as upbeat and exciting as this tasty morsel, so we are delighted to reproduce it in full. I'll now hand you over to locally-based Glass Technologist, Peter Wren Howard. Just read it and be suitably impressed when you see where all this top-hole equipment was made ...

'We recently completed the installation of a new double studio for the Bild-Werk International Academy at Frauenau in Bavaria. My assistant David Johnson and I built all the equipment in Stourbridge and it was transported to Germany towards the end of June, where we set it up in time for the first masterclass.

This was given by Karen Willembrinks and her partner, Jason, from Washington State with Louise Cloke from Bath as a teaching assistant. Pictures were taken on the first day of operation. This marked the end of a long period during which Bild-Werk were unable to operate their original furnace as it was far too costly to run.

They searched for a long time throughout Europe to find a system that they were confident could substantially reduce their running costs and after visiting several studios we had built in the UK including the Redhouse Cone, Broadfield House, Loco Glass in Cirencester and spoken to some our Dutch customers they decided to ask us to provide them with their new equipment. The 3.25 tons of bricks that were sent by road were late turning up, and with the first master class due to start on Wednesday 3rd July they finally arrived on the preceding Thursday. They did not believe we could do it but we managed to get the first furnace up and running on Saturday 29th June and the second one was running the following day. Needless to say we were knackered but we had done it, and they really had believed it was impossible. There is a delightful Bavarian tradition, when new furnaces are built they hold a furnace blessing ceremony which involves unlimited quantities of beer, cheese, sausages, an oompah band, and the local pastor sprinkles the furnaces with Holy Water and also the person who built them. It was a thoroughly wonderful day, and the dancing went on way past midnight. I finally got back to Stourbridge last Sunday, and I have been slowly recovering since. All the best to you, Peter Wren Howard.'

Yep, that's right. Stourbridge. Bravo, Peter; a flag well flown.
